### **Regional studies**

During the summer a visit was made to Berwick-upon-Tweed with a view to developing a case study. The town, which has been part of a tug of war between England and Scotland for much of its early history, had significant Flemish influence during the medieval period not least because of its close trading links with Flanders. Jim Herbert a local historian from Berwick, will be our first guest blogger. He will be examining the Flemish influence in Berwick.

Work continues on case studies for Fife and Atholl/Glenshee. John Irvine has also begun to investigate the Flemish in Dundee.

### Paths of Flemish Immigration to Scotland

Professor David Dobson has worked extensively on emigration from Scotland as well as on the immigration of Huguenots and Jews to Scotland. He has been engaged by the project to undertake a study of the immigration to Scotland by Flemish people over the period 1550-1800. Much of this immigration will have taken place as a result of religious persecution in Flanders that took place in three waves during the period 1560-1635. A wide range of original sources in Scotland are going to be examined as part of this research.
